School Outreach

This was one of our major programs in 2023.

With our strategic plans in place (thanks to the **Nigerian Women Trust Fund NWTF**), we set out to impact more children in schools. We visited **17 schools** (6 primary and 11 secondary schools) and the records showed that a total of **2395 male** and **1912 female** students were positively impacted.

So far in the first quarter of **2024**, we have reached **2000 male** and **1700 female** students in 17 schools. As a result of the impact we have made through our monthly school outreaches, The Oyo State Ministry of Education, Science and Technology, has reached out to us requesting that we expand our reach to schools in all the 33 local government areas of the state. For us to accomplish this however, we will need enormous financial, logistic and manpower support. We are very hopeful that as you read this report, you will be inspired to give us your support both in cash and kind or possibly volunteer your time once in a month to join us in visiting schools.

Funded Project: LEAP AFRICA

Project Title: The Nigeria We Want



Towards the end of the year 2022, we were able to secure funding from LEAP AFRICA to train 50 young adults under our project titled "The Nigeria we want". Topics covered during this project were, leadership education, civic education, digital literacy and vocational skills.



The 35 young adults successfully trained had 10 weeks of training and 2 weeks of internship with verified local small and medium enterprises (SME). One of the trainees is now gainfully employed as a direct impact of the new skills she acquired and some have turned their vocational skills into a side hustle to generate income for themselves.







Funded Project: Nigerian Women Trust Fund (NWTF)

Project Title: Institutional Strengthening of staff, volunteers and CSOs.

In October 2022, we secured funding from the Nigerian Women Trust Fund (NWTF) to organise capacity building training/workshop for our staff and volunteers as well as some other NGO's and CSO's in Ibadan metropolis. In all, we trained 20 persons for a period of 4 months on topics such as (i) Proposal writing (ii) Report writing (iii) Funding and (iv) we developed our own strategic plan for three years 2023-2025.

This was presented to the Board of YcDEI at the end of the training. Present were the Chairperson -Dr. Mrs Adamito Iyun and Ms.Adesola Adesokan, with Rev Elekima Ekine as an observer, and all the participants. It was a bottomup approach and it has guided our focus this year to reach more students despite paucity of funds.





Funded Project: Collaborative Research & Impact Fund | Sponsored Center for

Sponsored by the Center for Universal Education (USA)

Project Title: Understanding learning issues for teenage pregnant girls and teenage mothers in Nigeria, Sierra Leone and Zimbabwe. (This was a cross-country project, and YcDEI was the implementing organisation for Nigeria).







We interviewed teenage mothers in Osun and Oyo states to understand their learning issues and coping strategies since getting pregnant.

Methodology

The methodology was based on an exploratory study design which sought to present an analytical narrative on rights of teenage pregnant girls and teenage mothers in Nigerian towards learning and their well-being. A mixed research design was utilized to address the research questions. Data collection included a combination of structured interviews, focus group discussions and key informant interviews. In all we worked with 27 pregnant girls.

Results & Lesson Learnt

Result

One major finding is the impact of societal stigma keenly felt by teenage pregnant girls. The weight of cultural expectations often forces these young mothers to prioritize family duties over educational pursuits. The prevalence of economic hardship, particularly in impoverished regions, compounds the struggle, as financial constraints become a significant barrier to pursuing formal education. The reluctance of partners or family support networks further amplifies the challenges faced by these girls, leaving them with limited options in securing a stable future through education. The majority of the girls/young mothers do not intend to go back to school but want to be gainfully employed to be financially independent to be able to end the cycle of poverty in their families by providing qualitative education for their young children. Only three out of the 27 teenage mothers desired to continue their education. Unfortunately, only one is married legally to the father of her child as a second wife. Within the school environment. teenage pregnant girls face stigmatization and discrimination, often being publicly used as cautionary examples rather than recipients of empathetic support. The consequence is a profound sense of isolation and low self-esteem, contributing to the reluctance to re-enter the formal education system.

Addressing the educational struggles of teenage pregnant girls in Nigeria requires a nuanced approach that considers the unique cultural dynamics, economic disparities, and social structures prevalent in the country. Efforts to dismantle societal stigma, provide financial support, and create inclusive educational environments must be tailored to the specific challenges faced by these young mothers in their respective contexts.

Lesson learnt

At YcDEI, we realised the power of qualitative education, religion and family support, especially the mother's support in reducing teenage pregnancy. Efforts should be put in place to ensure that all girls especially those in rural settings and those from single-parent or separated homes are supported to complete some form of basic education in order to be financially independent as poverty was discovered to be a major predictor of teenage pregnancy. In addition, the policy should be implemented to provide a second chance for girls to return to school after delivery without stigma. Lastly, men and young adolescent boys need to be groomed and educated to become responsible family heads.

Scholarships

During the year under review, we were able to support four female learners with scholarships in various forms through the generous donations of family and friends. Two are on full scholarships (Oreoluwa Falola and Jemima Victor), while the other two are on partial scholarship of tuition payment only (Zainab Aperun and Bolutife Adeniji).



International Day of the Girl Child: October 11

This program was intentionally hosted to have an engaging session with our 100 level students in Tertiary Institutions at a local park around The University of Ibadan where we had a lot to share and eat. There were 26 females present.







YcDEI Community Library

The library is open daily from Mondays to Fridays to any user. We intend to expand this because when we have other meetings or programs the library becomes unavailable. We also need to increase the books in the library. So we are considering writing some bookshops to donate books to us. We had about 50 new additional library users in the year 2023 precisely **27 males** and **25 females**.

There are some challenges identified in using the library which include

- (i) Late closing time of Schools
- (ii) Non-provision/ Unavailability of transportation fare to get to the library



Failed project: Women Economic Empowerment

We embarked on a two-month project to empower women economically by trying to form a cooperative society. Unfortunately, we did not succeed (though we were not surprised).

Challenges were

- (i.) Insufficient number for membership
- (ii.) Low contributions
- (iii.) No business plans presented by members
- (iv.) Unstable Funder


